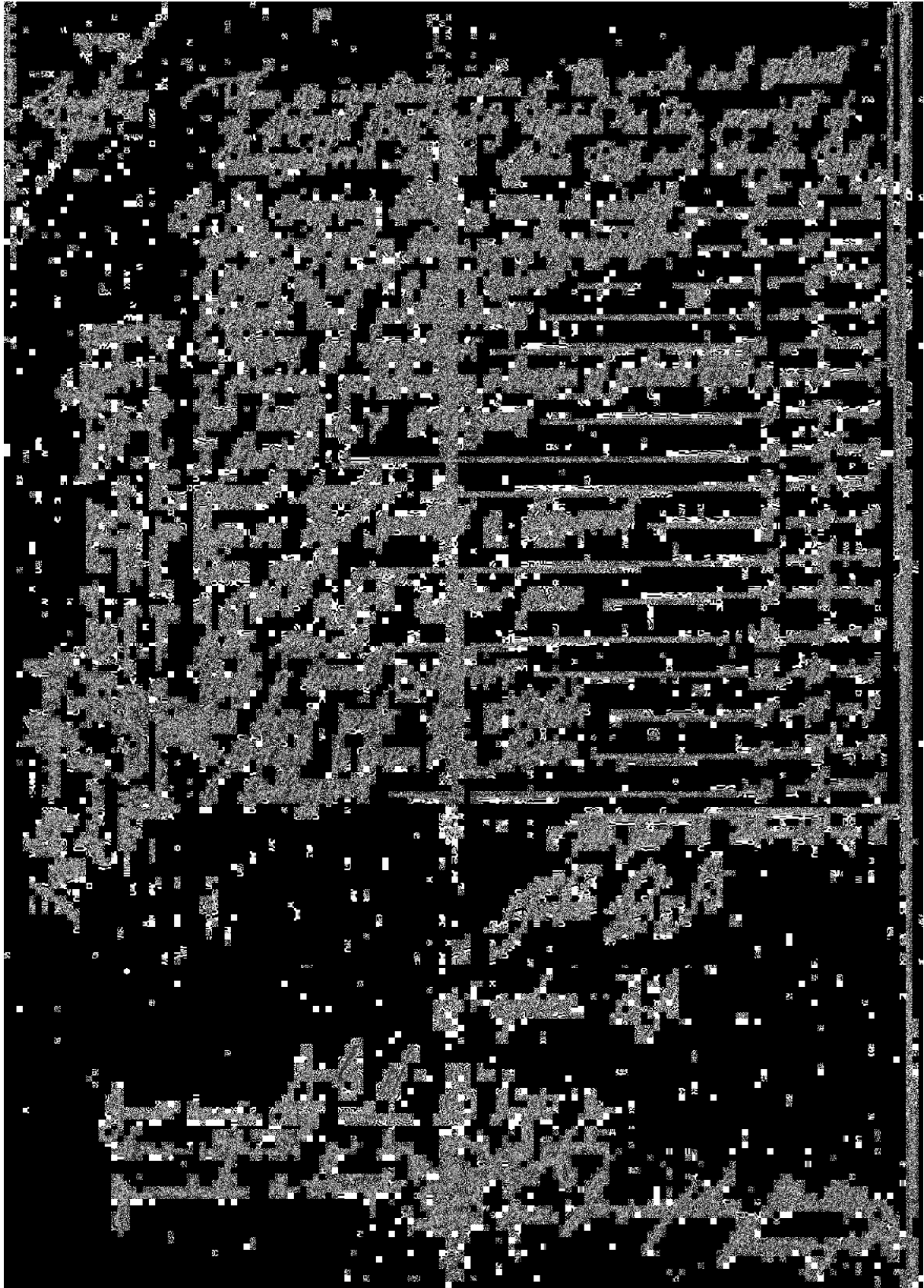

¹ Chaffing dish (chaving, chawfing, charfing, chalfyng): a dish for use on a chaffer (chauffer) – a small enclosed brasier containing hot coals, usually coal, for heating food and drink.

² Safe (safe): a food cupboard, usually with panels of woven hair to ventilate the contents.

³ Hogshead (hodgehead, howghead, howdghed): a large cask, of varying capacity, containing liquor.

⁴ Powdering (powthering, or pouthren) tub: in which meat was cured with salt and spice.

⁵ Canary: a sweet white wine, similar to Malmsey, imported from the Canary Islands (especially Tenerife) popular in the 17th and 18th centuries.

⁶ Vallance (vallend): a border of drapery hanging from the canopy of a bed, and from the mattress to the floor, a deep frill.

⁹ Lincey: A mixed fabric of wool and linen - linsey woolsey (also called lincey or linsey) gained its strength from its linen warp threads and color and warmth from its woolen weft threads. Because of this the stripes run across the fabric rather than with its length. Linsey was extremely popular for clothing the poor from (at least) the 16th to 19th centuries and in the 18th century was especially common for women's gowns, jackets and petticoats and for men's under jackets, waistcoats and occasionally coats, linings, trousers, leggings, aprons, and bed curtains.
